Notes on the Making of the Photographs

My first time photographing the Miller House was in 1976, while teaching in the Department of Architecture at Ball State University. I photographed the house, both interiors and exteriors, as part of a project documenting Indiana residential architecture initiated by my colleague and mentor Craig Kuhner. Those images are from the point of view of illustrating Eero Saarinen's design of this mid-century modern house. Craig also introduced me to the 4" X 5" view camera, the preferred format for architectural photography.

A couple of years later in 1978, I photographed the Miller Garden for the exhibition Pete Walker was putting together titled "Dan Kiley: Classicist in the Modern Landscape." I went to the site with Pete, and we met Dan in the garden. I had just graduated from Harvard GSD in landscape architecture, so I expected that Kiley would give us an elaborate theory that guided his design, something so commonly heard in design school. Kiley was remarkably concise. He said he was making a series of spaces and made the planting appear deliberate and ordered like a French Garden. It was a refreshingly simple and straightforward approach. I aimed to depict his work with its classical underpinnings and modernist spatial patterns by employing a wide-angle lens that expands the field of view, so that the trees and hedges that define spaces, overlap and interact in the design, are brought into the view. His design, consisting of a pattern of orthogonal spaces and linear elements in the landscape, was reiterated in the rectangular photographic frame, which can help to create compelling images that exploit the frame as an inherent characteristic of the medium.

I returned to the Miller Garden a third time in 1996 when I photographed it for my own book *American Designed Landscapes: A Photographic Interpretation* published by Spacemaker Press. Most of the images that were later included in other books and magazines were done at that time. The photograph of the sunrise over the east lawn (12) illustrates how attention to the frame is the fundamental editing tool of the photographer. The view was setup before sunrise with the trees, hedges and foreground shrubs aligned horizontally. To maintain the horizontal lines and include all four oak trees in the view, the camera front on the 4" X 5" view camera was shifted to the right. It was then a matter of timing to get the right exposure as the sun appeared.

The 1999 book, *The Miller Garden: Icon of Modernism* by Gary Hilderbrand, included twenty-two of my color images, which followed six of Ezra Stoller's 1958 black and white images, originally done for Eero Saarinen's firm. I met Ezra Stoller when I was a graduate student at Harvard when he gave a lecture which was attended by only a dozen or so people, which was remarkable because Stoller was already one of the legendary photographers of modern architecture. The light turnout gave me the opportunity to talk with him afterward. He was remarkably humble and generous. As I was shifting my focus from photographing buildings to landscapes, I wanted to do for landscape architecture what Ezra Stoller had done for architecture.










































