# Notes on the Making of the Photographs

The *Quinta da Regaleira* is a residence and garden composed of a series of scenographic effects that reflect the idiosyncratic tastes of both its owner and designer. It is one of the most unusual and mysterious landscapes of the late nineteenth to early twentieth centuries, that has survived intact, just outside the historic center of Sintra. The wealthy owner, António Augusto de Carvalho Monteiro (1848-1920), originally from Brazil, moved to Portugal along with his wife in 1876. He was an intellectual and bibliophile who studied botany and zoology, helping to found the Lisbon Zoo. Carvalho Monteiro was a follower of Christian Military Orders as well as Hebrew prophets, and was a great collector of butterflies, rare manuscripts, and musical instruments. He was a lover of music, particularly the opera, where he likely met Luigi Pietro Manini, whom he later selected to be the designer of the architecture, interiors, and landscape at *Quinta da Regaleira*.\*

Luigi Pietro Manini (1848-1936) was a stage designer at La Scala opera house in Milan, until moving to Portugal in 1879 to become the lead designer at *Real Teatro São Carlos* in Lisbon. Carvalho Monteiro asked Manini to design his property in Sintra, after rejecting a design by a French architect. At forty years old, Manini had shifted to architecture, having designed several residences near Sintra. He approached the design of buildings and landscapes as if he were making stage sets, with his own personal taste introduced by making contrived places based on myths and stories from the past. Manini revived the style of late Portuguese Gothic for the *Palácio* (1,4,6,7), which was positioned at the lowest elevation of the

mountainside site, on the foundations of an earlier house. Manini retained several other existing structures and paths, including the *Via Sacra*, originally a route built for pilgrims going to the top of the mountain. A pedestrian entrance, or *loggia* (2), along the street connects up a flight of steps to the 100m long Promenade of the Gods (3,10), that leads to an entry stair of the residence (4). A second entry for vehicles is further along the street at a courtyard with a chapel that is at the main level (6).

A broad path from the house and chapel ascends the slopes with switchbacks to connect to a series of remarkable settings, including an initiatic well, a cylindrical opening in the earth with a helicoidal staircase, that descends on a symbolic journey used in initiations (34,35). The route, probably inspired by Dante's *Inferno*, descends about 27m to a tunnel, which leads to the light at the *Laga da Cascata* (lake and waterfall), at a lower elevation on the site (36-39). Manini composed several other elaborate scenes, including terraces (10,20), pools with bridges (11-13), fountains (14-16), Gothic towers (21-22), grottoes (38), and a ziggurat (26-27). Smaller winding paths, some barely one meter wide with irregular stairs, are cut into the steeper grades, offering multiple routes through this varied and complex landscape (30,33). As a stage designer, Manini had a holistic vision for the house and landscape, and complete control over the visual design, as well as the lighting and sound, to transform the mountainside into a choreographed sequence of experiences that was the setting for the life of Carvalho Monteiro and his family, friends and visitors.

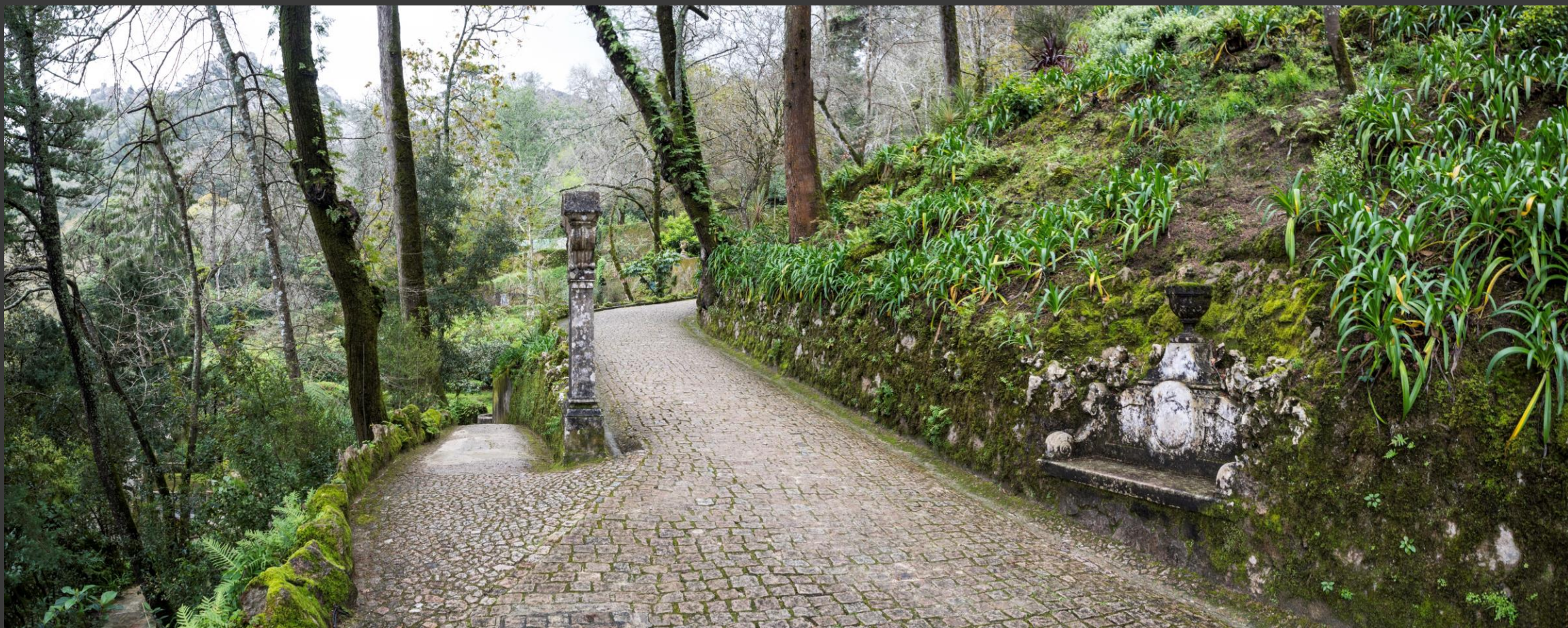
