Notes on the Making of the Photographs

It is not a simple task to document in photographs both the complexity and beauty of Thomas Jefferson's Academical Village. The fifty-acre site with an integrated ensemble of buildings embodies concepts and ideals about making a place for education, that is distinctly American in its embrace of the landscape, as well as appropriately fit to the specific characteristics of the site. The photographs illustrate site planning, architectural and landscape design, along with some of the subsequent modifications and additions to the original campus, which opened in 1825.

I first photographed the Academical Village in 1996 with a 4" X 5" view camera and a 2 ¼" X 6 ½" panoramic camera, and returned almost thirty years later to complete the photography with a digital camera. While the Rotunda, Lawn and flanking buildings are very familiar landmarks, each trip elicits a different set of emotions, as one's sentiments and reactions evolve over time, just as the landscape is dynamic and changes with time. Immersion in such a significant design brings forth intense feelings; time almost stops when there is such a profound experience of a place. I tend to work quite rapidly to capture the images, which is facilitated by using a digital camera. Once the passion for the photography subsides, then it is time to pause and reflect, and look forward to the process of editing the images and seeing the product of the visualizations, and at times, amazed at what a site looks like transformed into photographs.

The Academical Village is typically illustrated with an emblematic view of the terraced Lawn and Rotunda. While many books show only one or two key images of landmark projects, I have elected to include over forty images. The goal is to give a more systematic visual overview while depicting the experience of walking through the site, illustrating the in-betweens, as well as the highlights, in this harmonious blend of buildings and landscape.

The first image illustrates the Rotunda at the top of a ridge, since the topography of the site figures so prominently in the site planning. Steps, sloping walks, and terraces are required for adaptation to the terrain of Jefferson's plan for a U-shaped group of buildings, opening and descending toward the south. These transitions in grade are recurring and appear in every few photographs. Most of the images are architectural photographs, which require controlled, precise depiction of the substantive qualities of these neoclassical buildings. Several views are centered on facades, as these render the information in a straightforward way without distorting the scale, and tend to amplify the symmetrical qualities of Jefferson's Rotunda and pavilions. Some pictures are framed through columns in the foreground, and also show deep landscape space beyond, with the intention that this balanced layering illustrates the successful integration of architecture and landscape architecture at the Academical Village.
